
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## For Grandpa

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
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Timmy loves his Grandpa, they always have fun together. Going fishing, reading and playing board games, Grandpa loves doing them all with Timmy.


Later, Timmy asks his parents, "What happened to Grandpa, is he alright?"

"Is there any way he can stop his hands from shaking and control his body again?" Timmy asks hopefully.



Timmy is still scratching his head when he hears a commotion in the living room.




Grandpa is yelling at Timmy's dad, "I don't want to take the medicine! I am fine!!" he shouts, knocking the pills onto the ground.

As Timmy goes home, he suddenly has a brilliant idea. "I know what I can do to make Grandpa feel better!" he shouts.




At home, Timmy immediately goes to work on his idea. He spends all night searching, drawing, cutting and mixing. At last he is ready to bring his new idea to Grandpa.
