COVID-19 VACCINE: RESOURCES IN MO & IL

Area Hospitals

BJCHealthCare and Washington University Physicians are now allowing both Missouri and Illinois patients to <u>preregister</u> to receive a COVID-19 vaccine online.

Mercy has set up <u>online registration</u> for its patients to receive a notification when appointments, depending on a patient's eligibility, are available.

<u>SSMHealth</u> patients can sign up through their <u>MyChart account</u> and will receive an email when they can register for a vaccination appointment.

St. Luke's Hospital patients submit an application <u>online</u> to receive a vaccine. If they are eligible, they will receive an email inviting them to make an appointment. The website notes that with a limited supply, an appointment is not guaranteed with an application.

<u>Missouri</u>

FRANKLIN COUNTY: The <u>Franklin County Health Department</u> said it does not yet have access to the vaccine. When it does, it will provide updates on its <u>website</u> and <u>Facebook page</u>.

JEFFERSON COUNTY: The health department has started the process of collecting contacting information of people who are interested in a vaccine through a <u>COVID-19 Vaccine Info Request Form on its website</u>.

LINCOLN COUNTY: <u>The Lincoln County Health Department has launched a</u> <u>COVID-19 pre-registration form</u>.

ST. CHARLES COUNTY: <u>St. Charles County's online form</u> is a true preregistration for people who live and work there.

ST. FRANCOIS COUNTY: The county health department has a <u>COVID-19</u> <u>Vaccination Pre-registration form</u> where people can submit contact information and be notified when they will be eligible to receive a vaccine. The health department noted on its website that it could be "several weeks" before people are notified.

ST. LOUIS CITY: The City of St. Louis Department of Health has yet to receive any COVID-19 vaccines, but city residents now have a way to stay up-to-date on vaccine distribution when they become available through <u>its survey page</u>.

City residents can sign up to get vaccine and vaccination notifications. Those who sign up will be updated on the status of vaccine availability and the phased distribution of the vaccine.

ST. LOUIS COUNTY: <u>St. Louis County also offers a vaccine pre-registration</u> <u>page</u>. At this point, the county will only be able to follow up to get you a vaccine if you're in the 1A category and are not getting the shot from your hospital or long-term care facility.

<u>Illinois</u>

CLINTON COUNTY: <u>The Clinton County Health Department</u> is currently vaccinating health care workers in Phase 1A, according to its Facebook page. The department is taking names of heath care workers and people over the age of 75. Call the department at 618-594-2723 for more information.

MACOUPIN COUNTY: <u>The county has an online survey</u> that people can fill out if they are interested in receiving the vaccine.

MADISON COUNTY: To track interest in vaccination and better prepare for distribution, Madison County's health officials are <u>asking residents to</u> <u>complete a questionnaire</u>.

MONROE COUNTY: <u>The health department</u> is in the process of administering the vaccine and people are encouraged to sign up on a <u>notification system</u> <u>called Code RED</u>. The county will use this system to alert residents when it is their turn. People should fill out a <u>COVID-19 Vaccine Consent Form</u> and bring it when them when they arrive for their appointment.

ST. CLAIR COUNTY: <u>The county health department</u> is gathering information from those who work and live in the county and are interested in receiving the vaccine. People who complete the <u>Vaccine Notification Form</u> will be added to a list the receive updates and notifications regarding the vaccine.
